

ECES Ranked **Among Top Think Tanks in MENA** and World's Top **Domestic Economic Policy Think Tanks**

The Global Go to Think Tank Index Report (GGTTI) is issued by the University of Pennsylvania. The obective of this report is to help bridge the gap between knowledge and policy. ECES was listed in 3 out of 4 ranking categories of the report: "Top Think Tanks by Region", "Top Think Tanks by Area of Research" and "Top Think Tanks by Special Achievement".

The GGTTI Report was suspended in 2021 due to the sudden passing of its author, James McGann. For more details and to download the 2020 Global Go To Think Tank Index Report.

Top Think Tanks by Region	Think tanks in this category are classified by region, including 10 different regions. ECES ranked fifth in the "Top Think Tanks in the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) region", and second in Egypt following Al-Ahram Center for Political and Strategic Studies (ACPSS).
Top Think Tanks by Area of Research	This category includes 15 different areas. ECES is ranked 41 on the "Top Domestic Economic Policy Think Tanks" list, and first in Egypt. It is the only Egyptian think tank listed in this category, which ranks leading domestic economic policy think tanks around the world. According to the report, top think tanks in this category have high quality, innovative research and strategic analyses of domestic economic policy, covering a wide range of topics such as money supply, interest rates, macro and microeconomics, trade and investments, among others.
Top Think Tanks by Special Achievement	ECES is included in the "Best Policy and Institutional Response to COVID-19" list. Think tanks selected on this list are listed alphabetically with no rank given. ECES is one of only two Egyptian think tanks on the list, the other being the Information and Decision Support Center. The list of "Top Think Tanks by Special Achievement" selects global think tanks that were able to redirect their research programs, and organize their resources to respond effectively to the disruptions caused by the pandemic.







Establishment

ECES was established in 1992 under Law 32 of 1964 as a non-profit, non-governmental organization. It was founded with the objective of promoting economic development in Egypt by conducting and disseminating applied policy research in light of international experience. The Center's founders believed that the creation of an independent think tank was in the best interest of Egypt, especially since the economy was undergoing a process of transformation that has continued to this day. Financially, ECES received support as per an endowment agreement between the Egyptian government and the United States Agency for International Development (USAID). Support was also provided by the ECES members themselves, as well as organizations such as the World Bank and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP).

Take-off

After a gestation period, during which the Center's physical infrastructure was put in place and key staff appointed, ECES initiated a number of research activities. However, it was not until 1996 that the founders' vision was translated into a systematic work program with diverse activities, including regular forums for discussion and dissemination of research, and a series of publications. Since then, the Center's strategy has been based on two main pillars: knowledge generation and knowledge dissemination. Knowledge generation is decidedly in favor of applied policy research, and knowledge dissemination is guided by the strong desire to reach out to as many stakeholders as possible, whether through open forums, publications, and/or the ECES website (www.eces.org.eg).

Sustainability

Slowly but surely, the Center has acquired a reputation for producing relevant, quality research and offering objective advice on the economic challenges facing Egypt. This reputation helped the Center acquire an endowment of LE 50 million, which will ensure the independence and sustainability of ECES for years to come.

Digital Presense

To ensure wider dissemination, ECES paid special attention to the media and the development of a wellfunctioning website. With respect to the media, the Center established a tradition of holding an annual three-day workshop for economic reporters; providing them with a platform for discussing topical issues and sharing best practices in effective economic reporting. Also, recognizing the importance of social media as a powerful tool for broader dissemination, we expanded our online presence through the different social media platforms. As for the website, a new state-of-the-art website has been developed and launched in 2023 to bring our research activities to a larger audience. Every effort is made to ensure that it is userfriendly and continuously updated in both Arabic and English to convey information about the Center's recent and upcoming events. Furthermore, in keeping with the spirit of public interest, visitors have been allowed to download ECES publications free of charge. 


ECES IN RETRO-SPECT

Accomplishments

Aside from our average of 77 publications per year, we further expanded our outreach through introducing a wide spectrum of research publications aimed at data & info dissemination (e.g., Your Guide To Industrial Investment in Egypt, Women Entrepreneurs Guide). While most publications were written in English, some were written in Arabic and others were translated to ensure wide readership. For the same reason, the writing style of most of these publications is essentially nontechnical.

During the same period, the Center also organized 394 forums for the exchange of views among different stakeholders, averaging at least three events per month. The number of conference participants typically exceeded 200, while discussion each roundtable included around 70 participants. In both instances, the speakers and participants were carefully selected to ensure diversity of views and representation. Policymakers, parliamentarians, academia, private sector leaders, non-Egyptians, and members of civil society were invited, without prejudice to political affiliation.





The Future is Now. Our Data Analytics Unit is Growing!

Given its important role in understanding data and information, the Egyptian Center for Economic Studies has established two years ago a special unit for Data Science and has started with Big Data analytics. Big Data analytics is the process of collecting, organizing, and analyzing a large amount of data to uncover hidden patterns, correlations, and other meaningful insights.

Egypt's Economic Profile and Statistics (Annual)



Intended mainly for investors and the business community, it provides summary data and information on various aspects of the Egyptian economy.



Egypt's International Ranking (Annual)



This series aims to track Egypt's annual ranking in various indicators (economic, environmental... etc.) compared to role model countries, direct competitors, neighboring countries and others.









2. Diversified Publications Working Papers



This series represents work in progress rather than conclusive results, and aims at making research results available early on to promote the exchange of ideas.



Publications with International Organizations



ECES collaborates and partners with various international organizations in addressing key economic issues. One of the outcomes of such collaboration includes contributing to publications issued by these organizations. ECES publishes these publications under this series.







In addition to the Center's regular publications, ECES also frequently compiles the research results of a flagship activity into one published volume.







Your Guide to Industrial Investment in Egypt (ECES Initiative)

ECES launched an information guide titled "Your Guide to Industrial Investment in Egypt." The guide is an ECES initiative aimed at providing key information that investors need about Egyptian governorates. It comprises general, region-specific and detailed information, including detailed maps of governorates with utility and energy prices, investment regulations, investment incentives, tax structure, customs regulations, trade agreements, and procedural steps. Such information is needed by investors and is often not found in one single place.

ECES published the Guide in Arabic and translated it into four different languages: French, English, German and Chinese in order to expand its dissemination and outreach to a large number of investors of different nationalities. The Guide is also available on CDs to maximize its benefits, and can be freely downloaded at the ECES website.

Guide information and data are updated regularly.



Entrepreneurial Guide for Egyptian Women

In partnership with the National Council for Women, ECES conducted a study funded by the Canadian Embassy in Cairo, aimed at identifying impediments to the economic empowerment of women in Egypt and the major drivers of change. A team of ECES researchers conducted the study, which covered about 13 Egyptian governorates.

In late 2019, ECES conducted a follow-up survey on Women Entrepreneurial Guide to assess its outreach and evaluate the viability of its content based on real experience. The survey was distributed among practitioners from the NCW, MSMEDA and number of banks, who attended the ToT sessions given by ECES in June 2018 to disseminate the guide. The survey achieved a very good response rate. Early results show good outreach level and positive feedback regarding the content.

ECES is now working on updating the guide and a new edition will be published in 2024.

ECES policy briefs are short analyses of pressing economic issues that provide policy options and recommendations on the best option to inform policy-makers in a clear manner.



Distinguished Lectures



This program brings to Egypt international scholars and practitioners reputed for their important contributions to economic thought and policy formulation. The gathering provides a forum for prominent economists to articulate and exchange views and experiences with selected audiences from government, business and academia.



Egypt's Economic Crises: The Way Out and Possible Solutions



This series of working papers aims to support the economic reform in Egypt through a set of policy recommendations that would contribute to placing the Egyptian economy on the right track.



Policy Viewpoints



The Policy Viewpoint series is intended to contribute to the discussion of ideas and policy options for enhancing economic development in Egypt. The series is based on research conducted by ECES. The content and recommendations are endorsed by the Center's Board of Directors.

Business Process Analysis on Exporting and Importing Few Specific Products

March 12 - 15

ECES, in collaboration with the USAID Trade Reform and Development in Egypt project, organized this 3-day workshop to discuss the findings of a study conducted by ECES on the import and export processes for a few specific products:



The study aimed to identify the main impediments facing exporters and importers in Egypt. The process analysis covered export of ready-made garments, home textiles, marble and granite, and tomato products; as well as import of palm oil, iron and steel; parts and accessories for tractors and motor vehicles, and polymers of ethylene in primary forms.

The workshop featured effective participation from a select group of stakeholders, including government officials, businesses and experts.

Business Process Analysis on Exporting and Importing Few Specific Products the Concluding Session

May 8

Egyptian importers and exporters encounter various impediments in their business processes despite the government's serious attempts to improve performance. This raises a key question about the real roots of poor efficiency, and whether the current efforts can really solve the roots of the problems. ECES conducted a detailed study of the main impediments encountered by Egyptian importers and exporters. The study attempted to document the life cycle of the import and export process of a few products, namely exporting ready-made garments, textiles, marble and granite, and tomato products; and importing palm oil, tractor and vehicle spare parts and accessories, iron and steel, and ethylene polymers in their primary form. ECES, in cooperation with the USAID Trade Project in Egypt, held a series of roundtable discussions on the issue, with this concluding roundtable observing wide participation from diverse audience representing the government and the business community in Egypt.







Institutional and Structural Reform

Industrial Development Authority: Key Problems and Proposed Solutions

March 19

Organized in collaboration with CIPE, this event aimed to discuss the main findings of a study conducted by ECES on the challenges pertained to the Industrial Development Authority (IDA) and proposals to address them. Amid wide participation from a diverse audience, IDA Chairman Mohamed Abdel Karim spoke on key IDA developments driven by the ECES study findings. ECES and CIPE had organized a discussion forum in 2022 on IDA performance and the impediments encountered by industrial investors.

Assessment of the Industrial Developer Experience in Egypt and the Potential for Future Expansion

May 18

This roundtable discussed the findings of an ECES study assessing the experience of the industrial developer in Egypt, which was highly successful. However, industrial developers are currently facing a number of challenges, most importantly, the multiplicity of state agencies entrusted with the authority to own, use or dispose industrial land, absence of a national strategic plan, lack of a clear legal framework, the dual role played by the state authorities, etc. Increasing investment and exports are the lifeline for Egypt's recovery from the current crisis. The industrial developer is the fastest and most economically efficient contributor to achieving these two goals.





Activation of Cooperatives in Egypt: Are Present Efforts Going in the Right Direction?

September 19

Despite its importance and success as an economic model in many international experiences, Egypt's cooperative sector is not as effective as it should be. The government is notably exerting efforts to develop the sector. Held in collaboration with the Center for International Private Enterprise (CIPE), this roundtable aimed to discuss the important role played by cooperatives and whether the development efforts by the government are on the right path. ECES hosted, via zoom, Joost Geijer, Economic Counsellor at the Netherlands Embassy in New Delhi and former Head of the Economic Section in Cairo Embassy to present the Netherlands experience in cooperatives. ECES Executive Director and Director of Research Abla Abdel-Latif gave a presentation on the cooperative system in Egypt. The presentation discussed legal framework of cooperatives in Egypt, giving a detailed example of agricultural cooperatives, and comparing the Egyptian agricultural cooperative system with best international practices.







The EU countries concluded about 221 natural gas agreements with countries in the Middle East due to the war in Ukraine, enhancing bilateral cooperation between Europe and Middle Eastern countries. Held in Egypt for the first time, this regional meeting was organized and hosted by ECES in collaboration with the Italian Institute for International Political Studies (ISPI) and King Abdullah Petroleum Studies and Research Center (KAPSARC). Demand in Egypt's Labor Market -Q1 Y2 (via ZOOM)

January 16

ECES, in collaboration with NBE, is conducting this quarterly analysis for the second year. This webinar discussed findings of the detailed analysis conducted by ECES of the status of Egypt's labor market during the first quarter.

As ECES is conducting this analysis for the second year, it was possible to compare data year over year. The analysis put greater focus on specific geographical areas and the sectors facing chronic job creation problems. A database of available jobs for people with disability is underway, and machine learning in addition to the usual econometric tools are used.

Demand in Egypt's Labor Market - Q2 Y2

May 29

In this quarter, ECES conducted a detailed analysis of job supply and demand in the global freelance labor market for the first time in Egypt. The analysis focused on software jobs, comparing Egypt with India. Findings of the analysis show that jobs continued their decline nationwide in all sectors except tourism and banking. Specifically, manufacturing saw the largest decline in jobs. Job creation is highly centralized in Cairo and Giza. The Egyptian economy does not produce sufficient jobs, and the vast majority of job applicants are not qualified.





Demand in Egypt's Labor Market - Q3 Y2

September 4

This quarter, the analysis focused on the differences between males and females in terms of available jobs, and the wage gap between them. Overall, job creation declined during the reviewed quarter compared to the corresponding quarter in 2022. The Egyptian economy produces half of the jobs it used to produce for bluecollars and two-thirds of what it used to produce for white-collars. The increasing number of job seekers indicates that the economy does not add adequate jobs. Only 6.1 percent of total available jobs require females, while 61.9 percent of jobs require males. Gender is not a precondition in 31.9 percent of jobs. Females suffer from more difficult job conditions compared to their male counterparts, in addition to weak insurance coverage among females compared to males. Generally, firms offer higher wages to males than females. This gap persists even after taking the sector, level of experience, as well as educational qualification into account.

Demand in Egypt's Labor Market - Q4 Y2

December 21

This quarter, the analysis show that software and customer service have created the most jobs during the reviewed quarter. Though IT and software jobs saw a 50% YoY drop, the results indicate they were up by 23% during the last quarter of 2023. Similarly, customer service jobs also saw a decline of 58% YoY. However, compared to the previous quarter, new job postings were up by 104% during the last quarter.



ECES organizes a series of webinars intended to discuss findings of a detailed guarterly analysis of Egypt's labor market. The analysis, which is the first of its kind in Egypt, aims to support decision makers as well as job seekers, by bridging the gap between supply and demand in the

Energy Crisis and the Future of the World: Is There an "Energy Cold War?"

September 2023

The global energy landscape has gone through various changes by events such as the Russia-Ukraine war, the COVID-19 pandemic, and internal disputes within OPEC+. Alongside these disruptions, the entry of new players in the energy sector has redefined players in the energy markets. This paper highlights those escalating tensions and shifting trade partners. It describes the situation as the "energy cold war" going hand-in-hand with the actual war in Ukraine. By looking at the interactions between major economic blocs, the paper attempts to explain how energy markets have transformed into arenas of strategic national interests among major global economies. It is organized into four sections: the first section outlines the energy situation over the past decade; sections two and three detail shifts in energy trade and sources and analyse the broader socio-economic repercussions of the ongoing crises. The final section analyses the present infrastructure of energy production and transportation in the world to attempt to predict what is going to happen from a technical perspective.

Bank Secrecy in Egypt Amendment of the Unified Tax Procedures Law

On 18 December 2022, a draft law was passed by the House of Representatives amending article 78 of the Unified Tax Procedures Law. The amendment would add a paragraph to article 78 allowing the Egyptian Tax Authority to obtain information on the personal accounts of the banks' clients for the purpose of international tax agreements concluded between Egypt and other countries. The background behind this amendment, its causes and impact are addressed in this publication.
